Tasmanian Association for Recreational Fishing Inc.

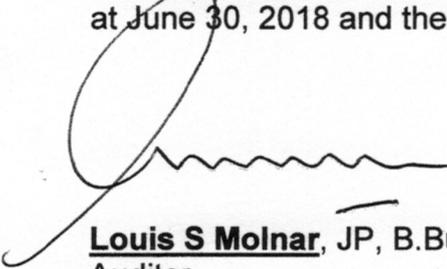

Chief Executive Officer's Report

TARFish Annual General Meeting – 20th November 2018

I present my eleventh annual report as the Chief Executive Officer of TARFish having assumed the role in January 2008. TARFish was established in 2004 to represent the interests of recreational marine fishers across Tasmania. Since its commencement TARFish has continued a process of development and growth guided by our Strategic Plan. As can be seen in the following report TARFish is extensively involved, both directly and indirectly, in all issues, activities, and relevant research on behalf of recreational marine fishers in Tasmania and effectively looks after the interests of recreational marine fishers in Tasmania.

TARFish activities and achievements for 2017/18

1. Six TARFish meetings held:

- 5 Ordinary General Meetings
 - 14th Aug, 24th Oct, 20th Feb, 17th Apr & 19th June
- Special General Meeting – Nil
- Annual General Meeting held on 24th October 2017.

2. Key Performance Outcomes

- *Increased Associate Membership*

Following our continuing membership drive during the year membership increased from 3281 to 3300 Associate Members at the end of the year. Associate Membership has grown by a net of 19 people during the year. Members are situated in all regions of the state and across all demographics, with a large number of family members. Whilst membership has stabilised in recent years we continue to maintain broad membership across the state.

- *Prudent Financial Management*

The TARFish Committee closely scrutinised expenditure during the year. Revenue was above budget by 8.7% and expenditure under budget by 2.9% which resulted in Cash at Bank increasing by 1.0% for the year. Prudent financial management allowed TARFish to achieve its budgeted activities and outcomes and maintain medium term cash reserves.

- *Project Management*

TARFish successfully project managed the delivery and management of the National Recreational Fishing Conference on behalf of the national peak body, the Australian Recreational Fishing Foundation. The conference was held in Darwin in November and TARFish supported two of our Future Young Leaders, India Thompson and Chloe Hammersley to attend and hear from international and national speakers on the major challenges and opportunities our sector faces in the future.

- *World Recreational Fishing Conference (WRFC)*

The 8th World Recreational Fishing Conference was held in Canada in July and I, and TARFish Committee member Travis Preece, were privileged to attend on behalf of TARFish. Over 400 delegates attended the 5-day conference which united the global recreational fishing community - providing an essential forum to discuss current research. Held every three years, this is the only international conference focused solely on recreational fisheries. It was stimulating and thought provoking to attend the conference and hear expert talks on a broad range of topics that hold particular relevance to recreational fishing in Tasmania. World leading experts presented on high priority areas that interest and impact on recreational fishing across the globe. The exposure at the conference ensured that the attending TARFish representatives will continue to strengthen the skills, knowledge and experience of the TARFish Committee.

- *Constitution Review*

A review of the TARFish Constitution/Rules 2009 commenced during the year. The review by the TARFish Committee identified no major areas of amendment were required with most potential changes of an administrative nature only. The current Constitution/Rules and proposed amendments were reviewed by an external legal representative who indicated no major issues with proposed changes. It is expected the updated Constitution/Rules will be implemented during 2018/19.

- *TARFish Committee*

John Stanfield was appointed as one of two Associate Member Representatives on the committee.

- *Community support services*

The recreational fishing sector is a myriad of broad social and community involvement across the state. The TARFish Committee instigated an ongoing program to support a range of aligned community social services that benefit from recreational fishing.

During the year TARFish provided a \$500 donation to Tas Maritime Radio in support of the radio services they provide to recreational boaters/fishers across the state. This was a timely donation for TMR who were in the process of upgrading their central radio home location in Hobart.

The health and well-being benefits of fishing are readily understood by those who fish. TARFish teamed with the Parkside Foundation, who support people with disabilities, and donated a complete fishing tackle package which enabled the foundation to start a weekly fishing program for their clients.

- *Secure Future Funding*

TARFish successfully negotiated with the state government to secure a four-year funding arrangement from July 2018 to June 2022. This provides strategic stability for the association and provides a secure funding base to ensure the services and activities we provide to, and on behalf, of the recreational marine fishing sector are maintained into the future.

- *National Recognition*

TARFish and all peak bodies across Australia, and many more influential recreational fishers, had been working on recognition of recreational fishing in commonwealth legislation with all sides of politics for the last decade. In November, legislation to recognise recreational fishing came into effect. This will provide strategic benefits to the recreational fishing sector and we now need to make sure the same benefits exist in state legislation.

3. Annual Grant Deed.

TARFish provided the following services to the state government as part of our state government budget allocation.

Provision of comment and input in the development of policy and legislation relating to marine recreational fishing.

- Provided response to DPIPWE on proposed changes to East Coast Rock Lobster fishery
- Provided a submission to DPIPWE for the Abalone Fishery Draft Management Plan
- Provided DPIPWE with feedback on the Rock Lobster Total Allowable Catch for 2018/19
- Provided recommendation to DPIPWE re East Coast Rock Lobster Translocation Project permit amendment

Provision of comment and input on recreational fishing issues attendant with fisheries and marine environment policy and legislation development.

- Provided DPIPWE with a response to Tas. Mackerel Fishery Total Allowable Catch for 2018/19 fishing season.
- Provided DPIPWE with a preliminary response to the Tas. Fisheries (Mackerel) Rules review process.
- Provided preliminary response to DPIPWE re National Plan of Action - Seabirds

Provision of comment and input on recreational fishing issues in relation to marine farming development planning and policy.

- Chair and CEO met with Tassal to discuss our involvement with Community Advisory Groups that they were considering establishing.
- Met with Huon Aquaculture in late August to discuss Salmon Industry Growth Plan (Draft) & potential Marine Farming Forum.
- Provided submission into the state govts Salmon Industry Growth Plan (Draft) in late September
- Met with Huon Aquaculture in November to discuss Storm Bay expansion
- Met with Senior Govt representatives in November to receive an updated briefing on the governments amendments to the Sustainable Salmon Growth Plan
- Attended the 3 day 'Blue Future Salmon Conference' held by IMAS in Hobart in December. International/national speakers gave their thoughts on key issues facing the industry. Leadership in biosecurity, environmental performance accountability, the importance of community engagement, investment in science and research & innovation and capital investment were key themes.

- Provided a response to DPIPWE re permit application from Huon Aquaculture re Trumpeter Bay Lease.
- Provided a response to DPIPWE in relation to Draft Amendment No.5 Tasman Peninsula and Norfolk Bay Marine Farming Development Plan
- Attended an IMAS PHD Study presentation in late February titled “A coupling of Geographic Information System (GIS) with System Dynamics (SD) to improve spatio-temporal decision making for aquaculture development. The overarching outcome of this study will be the minimisation of adverse environmental impacts and improved social acceptability and economic return.
- Provided input to the Hon. Rob Valentine, MLC, who was having prepared a research report on the economic and social impacts of salmon farming on coastal communities in Tasmania.
- Met with national RSPCA representatives at the Tasmanian Seafood Industry Council Offices in early March to receive a briefing on their newly developed Salmon Industry accreditation scheme.
- Provided input into a PHD students thesis work titled Marine Aquaculture Approval Processes in Tasmania

Attend State-wide public meetings organised by Government as part of management plan reviews and consultation processes.

- Met with Tasports representative in Stanley in late May to be briefed on wharf closure due to public safety concerns re concrete cancer and under deck pinning degradation. Awaiting an Engineers Report before a decision is made re opening or permanent closure.
- Attended the 2018 Tasmanian Biosecurity Roundtable in Hobart in early June. Organised by Department of Agriculture and Water Resources and the Department of Primary Industries, Parks, Water and Environment (Tasmania).

Representation on the Recreational Fishery Advisory Committee. (RecFAC)

- Attended a DPIPWE Recreational Fishing Advisory Committee (RecFAC) meeting held in Devonport in mid-April.

Presence at public events which facilitates direct contact with recreational fishers.

- Attended a DPIPWE Fisheries Forum in Devonport in mid-April.
- Attended a Fishers 4 Fish Habitat workshop held in Campbell Town in August. IFS/AAT/NRM and Landcare were supporting organisations.
- Attended the Launceston Outdoor Show in September as an exhibitor.
- Attended the Tas Trout Expo at Cressy in September
- Attended Frombergs Dam at Ulverstone as part of the National Gone Fishing Day event on 15 October. Minister Rockliff attended along with his 3 daughters. Also attended the DPIPWE Fishcare Community Liaison Patrols at Port Sorell and Beauty Point as part of the Gone Fishing Day activities. Distributed some rods and tackle to participants in support of the day.
- Attended an Indigenous Fisheries Workshop in late February at Eaglehawk Neck to build relationships and contribute to their understanding of the various recreational fishing structures in Tasmania.

CEO Report to TARFish AGM on 20th November 2018

- Attended as an exhibitor at the 3-day Hobart Outdoor Show in mid-March. This is a new event this year organised by the Royal Hobart Show organisers and is very similar to the Launceston Outdoor Show. Held at the Glenorchy Showgrounds. Due to inclement weather attendees were below expectations. However, it should grow in following years and we intend to participate in 2019.
- Attended the announcement by the Liberal Party of their new policy ‘Taking Recreational Fishing and Boating to the next level’ in mid-February at Eaglehawk Neck
- Attended the launch by Minister Anne Ruston of the FRDC Project “The role of the recreational fisher in the stewardship of the Southern Bluefin Tuna fishery” at the end of April.
- Attended the Tas. Rock Lobsters Fisherman’s Association General Meeting in Launceston in late May.
- Attended AGFEST as an exhibitor in early May. We were in AGFESTs Boat Show section. Excellent crowd attendance with our Main Street location ensuring good passing traffic throughout the show. Provided City Park Radio with a small space on the Friday to broadcast from. We got good on-air interview time and key interviewers had to come to our site for interviews.
- Attended a MAST AGFEST 2018 Boat Show Post Stakeholder meeting in mid-June to review the success/improvements/suggestions etc for AGFEST 2019 Boat Show.

Production of quarterly TARFish Bulletin.

- 1500 distributed to TARFish Members and 3000 to 30 tackle stores across the state each quarter.

- Attended a South East Marine Park Forum meeting held in Hobart in early November
- Attended a 3-day meeting in Melbourne in February as an invited recreational fishing guest for the South East Management Advisory Committee (SEMAC). CEO was attending as an ARFF delegate. SEMAC provides recommendations to the AFMA Commissioners re commonwealth fisheries matters including annual Total Allowable Catch limits for upcoming seasons. With the recent recognition of recreational fishing in commonwealth legislation it is important that recreational fishing interests are considered in these federal structures.
